Single mothers with a high school diploma in the U.S. are 3 times more likely to live in poverty than when they hold a bachelor's degree

of single-mother students work 20 hours or more per week

54%

of single-mother students are enrolled in school full-time or a combination of fulland part-time

# Economic Impact of Postsecondary Attainment<sup>10</sup>

Single moms with postsecondary education earn more over their lifetime than single moms with only a high school education. Individual Additional Lifetime Earnings of Single Moms:

\$256,000 vs. \$625,000
